Procedural Safeguards

Through evidence-based research, innovative techniques, and global reach, the Pyramid Model framework empowers children, birth to five, to succeed in life.

NJEIS, in partnership with Montclair State University (MSU), will be offering the infant & toddler ePM modules, including an implicit bias e-module, infused with reflective consultation and discussion, to NJEIS practitioners at no cost.

Keeping Babies in Mind

This workshop promote awareness about the unique social and emotional development of our youngest children, the importance of reflective caregiving and parenting towards building resilience, and the centrality of forming relationships and social connections in practice.

PIWI

PIWI (Parents Interacting with Infants) is an early intervention model based on the premise that early development occurs within the context of the family and primary attachment relationships; consequently, the most important environment for early learning and development is the parent-child relationship. The PIWI model is primarily a philosophy and process, and its primary purpose is to facilitate an optimal environment for learning and development through three key components for young children and their primary caregivers: competence, confidence and mutual enjoyment.
